Credit Points for Extra-Curricular Activities

2. Goal

To encourage holistic development by recognizing and rewarding student participation in extracurricular activities, enhancing their skills and competencies in areas beyond the academic curriculum.

Key Highlights:

- A student can earn up to 2 credits per year and a maximum of 6 credits over three years.
- Activities are classified into categories, and hours are assigned based on roles and levels of participation.

- Students must maintain a diary documenting their participation, which is verified by the faculty in charge.
- o Credit points are calculated based on accumulated hours (30 hours = 1 credit).

Examples of Activities:

- o Participation in major college festivals (e.g., Moneta, Rostrum Spectrum).
- Holding leadership roles in associations such as Planning Forum, Literary Circles, or NSS.
- o Representing the college in intercollegiate events like debates and quizzes.
- o Engagement in community service and workshops.
